Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.

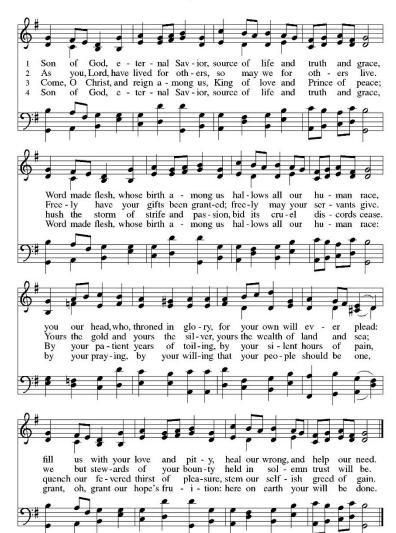
Receive our prayer, O God.

Dear Siblings in Christ,

"... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things ... If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit." (Galatians 5:22-23, 25)

Why are you here? Most likely you're reading this at your congregations annual meeting. And perhaps you are pondering this same question: "why am I here when I could be doing something else that's more exciting than a boring church business meeting?"

But what if congregation annual meetings were seen as more than just a "business meeting?" What if we thought of our Annual Meetings as the exciting continuation of our year-long discernment about where God is calling our congregation to go AND, even more exciting, as taking the first and biggest step of the new year into the calling from God that we discerned together?!

Annual Meetings are the time, usually the only time of the year, when the majority of your congregation gathers to make important decisions about leadership for the congregation (president, council members), finances (the budget, compensation packages), and how the congregation hopes and plans to do its ministry over the next year and beyond.

These necessary decisions are hopefully ignited from the values and principles sparked by the Holy Spirit through spiritual discernment. They emerge from hearts and spirits made bold by the transforming love of Christ and empowered through by the Spirit's fruit in "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-

control." They come from a mutually discovered purpose (why are we doing this?) and vision (where is God calling us to go?) in conversation with one another and with God.

What if we entered into our Annual Meetings with the perspective of opportunity and the mindset of generosity rather than just one more church-thing to do on a Sunday afternoon in January that's keeping us from watching the NFL playoffs? Imagine what God could accomplish in and through us for the sake of Christ's congregation, Christ's Church, and the wider world!

Congregations are not the only part of the church that have annual meetings. The Montana Synod, composed of congregations from across Montana and Northern Wyoming will also be having its Annual Meeting (also known as the Synod Assembly) in Great Falls, MT on May 30-31, 2025. As a Synod, we will walk on Christ's way together to elect the synod's leadership including a bishop, manage with generosity the blessings God has given to this Synod, and equip each other for listening to the Spirit's guidance, proclaiming Christ's Gospel, doing Christ's love, and collaborating for Christ's ministry. The theme for the 2025 Montana Synod Assembly is "Equipping for Hope."

There is a third Annual Meeting that will be happening this year- the ELCA's triannual Churchwide Assembly will meet in Phoenix, AZ on July 28-August 2, 2025. As the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, voting members will gather from diverse places across this country to discern the direction of the Holy Spirit in electing a new presiding bishop and new Churchwide secretary, managing the blessings the ELCA has been given, deciding how we will live as Christ's Church together, and how God is calling us as the ELCA to move toward God's future together.

In all of these opportunities to gather for "Annual Meetings" in the name of Jesus Christ, let us remember that we are each and all parts of Jesus' Church, the body of Christ, and let us be emboldened to live out our faith through the hope, love and joy poured into us by the Holy Spirit.

May your congregation be blessed in this New Year by the new life that comes to us only in Jesus Christ!

Pastor's Annual Report to the Congregation

This past year marked our 134th year of ministry as Our Savior's Lutheran Church. While none of our original members are still with us, their legacy continues.

Like those who were Our Savior's before us, we are centered in worship. We listen to God's Word as we hear scripture, we receive God's Word as we receive communion, and we step from worship into service as the Body of Christ shepherded by the Holy Spirit in this time and place.

I've been in awe this year watching that ministry continue in many ways through many people. In profoundly effective and quiet ways, Christ's work has been flowing through our hands. I've watched the humble volunteers who step forward to make sure fellowship is hosted following services and after funerals. I've watched the awesome commitment of members to remember the hungry in our prayers, but then to staff the FISH outreach and fund community ministries through quarterly offerings. I've watched quiet volunteers tend the upkeep of our building, prepare the altar and host as ushers for worship. I've seen individuals blend their voices to enrich our worship as our choir. I've experienced groups gathering to remember their neighbors and their fellow members in prayer. I've listened to the stories of those who lived Jesus' words - actually going to those who are prisoners to bring books, share gifts at holidays, be signs of grace. I've stood near the pulpit and watched the caring "check-ins" that happen as people take their regular spots in the pews. I've watched Christ's love embrace and support people as Our Savior's have surrounded persons bearing grief or illness with visits and cards and expressions of consolation and encouragement.

This is what God has continued to do through Our Savior's in this past year. It is a heritage of discipleship that glows with living faith.

This is where we find ourselves as Our Savior's. We are heirs of a long tradition of faithful worship and service. We are the stewards of a building and traditions what give us a base in which to gather

and from which to reach beyond our walls. We are doing what God has called us to do - listen to God's Word, then follow where Christ leads to work humbly and gently in care for each other and in service to our neighbors.

I expect this coming year will see us continuing that steady journey. Christ is our Shepherd. The Holy Spirit flows among us. God's work flows through our hands.

As in every generation, there are challenges. We are aging. Some of us are startled to see our parents (or grandparents) in the mirror. But with aging come some slowing down, treasuring the time we have with each other, taking no one for granted. We are generous - but we face the challenge of funding building and programs and staff. One challenge in this coming year will be finding ways to better bridge the gap between offering and expenses.

By God's grace, though, we have a profound resource. We are free. We are not shackled to patterns or methods which have been effective in our past. We are free to take what is useful in "how we've always done it" in the past and adapt to present needs and gifts and abilities. We are not frozen to routine, but free as children of the Reformation to continue to clarify what is our center, prune what is overgrown, and focus our community and our ministry where it is needed today.

Who knows what this new year will bring! Those who watch society and economics and politics can't say for sure. Those who wonder what the Church will look like in a new generation can't yet see what is coming. But Paul's words to Jesus' first followers reach into our journey; he writes, "I am confident, that the one who began working in you will bring God's purpose to completion in Jesus Christ....."

Thank you for your trust and support in this past year. Thank you for your partnership in the year ahead!

Our Fall Stewardship Appeal began two weeks before Reformation Sunday.

Letters were sent out to all the 176 households who receive our monthly Newsletter—used this year as the community towards which to direct our appeal. Many of those households include persons who have either moved or who have not been present in worship in the calendar year. Nonetheless, it was the place where our Appeal was directed.

As of the end of 2024, we have received responses from **Fifty Three Households**. The pledges we've received so far **total \$128,136**.

However, in 2024 we have received contributions from **One Hundred Eight Households**. Those contributions totaled **\$208,522.19**.

From that data, we can see that members of Our Savior's are very generous and very faithful in their financial support of our congregation. That commitment is strong. *Actual pledging*—that has received less of a response. In the end, Council has determined to use *Actual Giving* from 2024 rather than Pledges for 2025 in determining our 2025 Budget.

We continue to encourage responses! We have also included all Pledging information with our Council and our Property/Finance Committee so that they could make informed recommendations as the 2024 budget was being prepared.

There are many people involved in creating meaningful worship experiences for whom we are grateful: AV Techs, Altar Guild, Choir, Worship

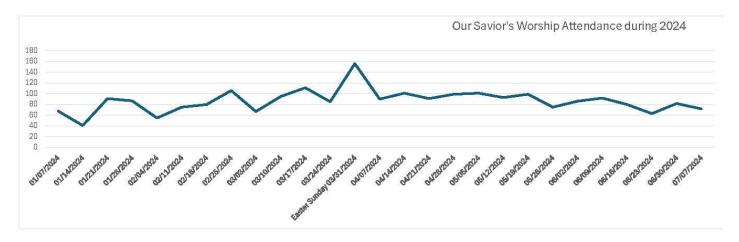
